

## Observation

From your observations, what answers to these questions can you find? Ask some of these to people you meet. As you do, remember that there's probably not one answer. What people will say about themselves may not be what you observe— or what others say. So, listen to people, *and* keep your eyes open and your mind engaged.

Listen (ask someone):  ☐ Are there distinctions between public and private spirituality? Religious practices?  ☐ What are the barriers that keep people from knowing God?  ☐ What does one have to do to have favor with God?  ☐ What happens after people die?
Values: Look:  ☐ What about this culture's dominant religious practice appeals to you?  ☐ What social evils do you see?  ☐ What about this way of life looks appealing to you?  ☐ What people significant to this culture's history are seen and mentioned? What seems to be important about them?  ☐ Why do you think people do? Say? Wear?  ☐ Based on what you see, what do you think these people would say about their life purpose?
